

Nevada Ranks 1st in Private Sector Job Growth Over the Year; Employment up 48,600 vs. 2017

Average Employment Growth by State, 2018 Fourth Quarter (Year over Year - Total Private Employment, All Industries



- Information obtained through the Quarterly Census of Employment and Wages (QCEW) Program provides
 a nearly complete job count based upon quarterly wage records submitted by employers whose employees
 are covered under the Unemployment Insurance System. As a result, historical information is subject to
 minimal, if any, revisions. This data encompasses jobs in all fifty states plus the District of Columbia.
 Because generating this information is a time-consuming process, it is only available with a 4-5 month lag.
- With data through the fourth quarter of 2018, Nevada has the fastest growing private sector in the United States ahead of Idaho, Utah, and South Carolina. 48,600 jobs were added relative to 2017, a growth rate of 4.1 percent.
- From 2007 to 2011, the Silver State ranked no higher than 37th of 51 in job growth rankings. Since 2014, it has been in the top five.


